### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This is a course on the mathematical foundations of *phylogenetics*: the reconstruction and analysis of evolutionary trees. The mathematics comes, primarily, from graph theory and probability theory. Important areas of application are epidemiology, evolutionary biology, and linguistics.

Required text: Charles Semple and Mike Steel: "Phylogenetics," Oxford Lecture Series in Mathematics and Its Applications No. 24.

Prerequisites: No specific classes are required. The textbook is written for graduate students of Biology/CS/Mathematics, but it is accessible to advanced undergraduate students.

Expected learning outcomes: After completion of the class, students should master the fundamental concepts of Phylogenetics. Concepts include but are not limited to the following: Rooted and unrooted trees, compatibility of trees, randomly generated trees, consensus trees, phylogenetic forests, the coalescent process, reticulate evolution and co-phylogeny, characters and convexity, character compatibility, parsimony, and sub- and supertree methods.

### LEARNING ASSESSMENT

Graded assessment is done through homework and exams. Other assessment techniques will also be used; these include direct questioning, and problems to be solved in class. Additionally, problems will be assigned for student self-assessment.

# **COURSE ORGANIZATION**

The plan is to cover major parts of chapters 1–6. Precise reading assignments will be posted on the course homepage after every class.

An in-class exam is given during the semester. Homework will be assigned 12 times during the semester. Students are encouraged to work on the homework problems in groups.

**Final grade:** Homework (10 assignments) and exams (2) are counted towards the final grade with weights as follows: Homework 50% (5% ea.), in-class exam 20%, and final exam 30%.
